My Dear Students,



Smart Cities – An Overview



"Smart city" has emerged as a buzzword in India ever since Prime Minister Narendra Modi outlined his vision for creating a hundred Smart cities. And, aside from the hype around the term "Smart cities" it does raise some pertinent questions such as what does it really mean to be a "smart city?" and why should Indians care about the smartness of their city? Indian cities are unique in that they confront the challenges of not only the 20th and 21st centuries but also some remnants from the 19th century. While cities like Bengaluru are participants in global innovation and increasingly compete with Silicon Valley to further enhance innovation, they also need to tackle important issues such as providing basic sanitation, public transport, clean water and effective waste management. So, the traditional approach of managing and maintaining our cities must change - both in mindset and in the way we administer them.

However, there is no universally accepted definition of a smart city. It means different things to different people. The conceptualization of Smart City, therefore, varies from city to city and country to country, depending on the level of development, willingness to change and reform, resources and aspirations of the city residents. A smart city would have a different connotation in India than, say, Europe. Even in India, there is no one way of defining a smart city.

In the imagination of any city dweller in India, the picture of a smart city contains a wish list of infrastructure and services that describes his or her level of aspiration. To provide for the aspirations and needs of the citizens, urban planners ideally aim at developing the entire urban eco-system, which is represented by the four pillars of comprehensive development-institutional, physical, social and economic infrastructure.

Smart Cities Mission of the Government is a bold, new initiative. It is meant to set examples that can be replicated both within and outside the Smart City, catalyzing the creation of similar Smart Cities in various regions and parts of the country.

The core infrastructure elements in a smart city would include:

- i. Adequate water supply,
- ii. Assured electricity supply,
- iii. Sanitation, including solid waste management,
- iv. Efficient urban mobility and public transport,
- v. Affordable housing, especially for the poor,
- vi. Robust IT connectivity and digitalization,
- vii. Good governance, especially e-Governance and citizen participation,
- viii. Sustainable environment,
- ix. Safety and security of citizens, particularly women, children and the elderly, and
- x. Health and education.

Application of Smart Solutions will enable cities to use technology, information and data to improve infrastructure and services. Comprehensive development in this way will improve quality of life, create employment and enhance incomes for all, especially the poor and the disadvantaged, leading to inclusive Cities.

Features of Smart City

Some typical features of comprehensive development in Smart Cities are described below.

Promoting mixed land use in area based developments:

Planning for 'unplanned areas' containing a range of compatible activities and land uses close to one another in order to make land use more efficient. The States will enable some flexibility in land use and building bye-laws to adapt to change;

Housing and inclusiveness:

Expand housing opportunities for all.

Creating walk able localities:

Reduce congestion, air pollution and resource depletion, boost local economy, promote interactions and ensure security. The road network is created or refurbished only

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for vehicles and public transport, but also for pedestrians and cyclists, and necessary administrative services are offered within walking or cycling distance.

Preserving and developing open spaces:

Parks, playgrounds, and recreational spaces in order to enhance the quality of life of citizens, reduce the urban heat effects in areas and generally promote eco-balance.

Promoting a variety of transport options:

Transit Oriented Development (TOD), public transport and last mile para-transport connectivity.

Making governance citizen-friendly and cost effective:

Increasingly rely on online services to bring about accountability and transparency, especially using mobiles to reduce cost of services and providing services without having to go to municipal offices. Forming e-groups to listen to people and obtain feedback and use online monitoring of programs and activities with the aid of cyber tour of worksites;

Giving an identity to the city:

Based on its main economic activity, such as local cuisine, health, education, arts and craft, culture, sports goods, furniture, hosiery, textile, dairy, etc;

Applying Smart Solutions to infrastructure and services in area:

Based development in order to make them better. For example, making Areas less vulnerable to disasters, using fewer resources, and providing cheaper services

Strategy for Development of Smart City:

The strategic components of area-based development in the Smart Cities Mission are city improvement (retrofitting), city renewal (redevelopment) and city extension (greenfield development) plus a Pan-city initiative in which Smart Solutions are applied covering larger parts of the city. Below are given the descriptions of the models of Area-based smart city development:

1. **Retrofitting:** This will introduce planning in an existing built-up area to achieve smart city objectives, along with other objectives, to make the existing area more efficient and liveable. In retrofitting, an area consisting of more than 500 acres will be identified by the city in consultation with citizens. Depending on the existing level of infrastructure services in the identified area and the vision of the residents, the cities will prepare a strategy to become smart. Since existing structures are largely to remain intact in this model, it is expected that more intensive infrastructure service levels and a large number of smart applications will be packed into the retrofitted smart city. This strategy may also be completed in a shorter time frame, leading to its replication in another part of the city.
2. **Redevelopment:** This will effect a replacement of the existing built-up environment and enable co-creation of a new layout with enhanced infrastructure using mixed land use and increased density. Redevelopment envisages an area of more than 50 acres, identified by Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) in consultation with citizens. For instance, a new layout plan of the identified area will be prepared with mixed land-use, higher FSI and high ground coverage. Two examples of the redevelopment model are the Saifee Burhani Upliftment Project in Mumbai(also called the Bhendi Bazaar Project) and the redevelopment of East Kidwai Nagar in New Delhi being undertaken by the National Building Construction Corporation.
3. **Greenfield development:** This will introduce most of the Smart Solutions in a previously vacant area (more than 250 acres) using innovative planning, plan financing and plan implementation tools (e.g. land pooling/ land reconstitution) with provision for affordable housing, especially for the poor. Greenfield developments are required around cities in order to address the needs of the expanding population. One well known example is the GIFT City in Gujarat. Unlike retrofitting and redevelopment, greenfield developments could be located either within the limits of the ULB or within the limits of the local Urban Development Authority (UDA).

4. **Pan-city development:** This envisages application of selected Smart Solutions to the existing city-wide infrastructure. Application of Smart Solutions will involve the use of technology, information and data to make infrastructure and services better. For example, applying Smart Solutions in the transport sector (intelligent traffic management system) and reducing average commute time or cost of citizens will have positive effects on productivity and quality of life of citizens. Another example can be waste water recycling and smart metering which can make a huge contribution to better water management in the city.

The smart city proposal of each shortlisted city is expected to encapsulate either a retrofitting or redevelopment or greenfield development model, or a mix thereof and a Pan-city feature with Smart Solution(s). It is important to note that pan-city is an additional feature to be provided.

For North Eastern and Himalayan States, the area proposed to be developed will be one-half of what is prescribed for any of the alternative models - retrofitting, redevelopment or greenfield development.

Implementation of the scheme:

Under this scheme, each city is required to establish a Special Purpose Vehicle (SPV) having flexibility regarding planning, implementation, management and operations. The body will be headed by a full-time CEO, with nominees of Central Government, State Government and ULB on its Board. The SPV will be a limited company incorporated under the Companies Act, 2013 at the city - level, in which the State/UT and the Urban Local Body (ULB) will be the promoters having equity shareholding in the ratio 50:50. The private sector or financial institutions could be considered for taking equity stake in the SPV, provided the shareholding pattern of 50:50 of the State/UT and the ULB is maintained and the State/UT and the ULB together have majority shareholding and control of the SPV. Funds provided by the Government of India in the Smart Cities Mission to the SPV will be in the form of tied grant and kept in a separate Grant Fund. For the purpose of implementation and monitoring of the projects, the

MoUD has also established an Apex Committee and National Mission Directorate for National Level Monitoring, a State Level High Powered Steering Committee (HPSC) for State Level Monitoring and a Smart City Advisory Forum at the City Level.

Also, several consulting firms have been assigned to the 100 cities to help them prepare action plans. Some of them include CRISIL, KPMG, McKinsey, etc.

Funding of smart cities:

The Smart City Mission will be operated as a Centrally Sponsored Scheme (CSS) and the Central Government proposes to give financial support to the Mission to the extent of Rs. 48,000 crores over five years i.e. on an average Rs. 100 crore per city per year. The additional resources will have to be mobilized by the State/ ULBs from external/ internal sources. According to the scheme, once list of shortlisted Smart Cities is finalized, Rs. 2 crore would have been disbursed to each city for proposal preparation.

According to estimates of the Central Government, around Rs 4 lakh crore of funds will be infused mainly through private investments and loans from multilateral institutions among other sources, which accounts to 80% of the total spending on the mission. For this purpose, the Government will approach the World Bank and the Asian Development Bank (ADB) for a loan costing ₹500 million and ₹1 billion each for 2015-20. If ADB approves the loan, it would be it will be the bank's highest funding to India's urban sector so far. Foreign Direct Investment regulations have been relaxed to invite foreign capital and help into the Smart City Mission.

Role of Foreign Governments and bodies in the Smart cities mission:

Ever since the government's ambitious project has been announced and cities have been shortlisted, many countries across the globe have shown keen interest to help specific shortlisted cities in building the smart cities and are willing to invest financially. Countries like Sweden, Malaysia, UAE, USA, etc. have agreed to partner with India

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for the mission. For example, UK has partnered with the Government to develop three India cities-Pune, Amravati and Indore. Israel's start-up city Tel Aviv also entered into an agreement to help with urban transformation in the Indian cities of Pune, Nagpur and Nashik to foster innovation and share its technical know-how. France has piqued interest for Nagpur and Puducherry, while the United States is interested in Ajmer, Vizag and Allahabad. Also, Spain's Barcelona Regional Agency has expressed interest in exchanging technology with the Delhi. Apart from foreign government, many organizations and multilateral agencies are also keen to partner with the Indian government and have offered financial assistance by way of loans. Some of them include the UK government-owned Department for International Development, German government KfW development bank, Japan International Cooperation Agency, the US Trade and Development Agency, United Nations Industrial Development Organization and United Nations Human Settlements Programme. There are 98 cities in India which have been enlisted for the smart city scheme, which includes cities like Delhi, Panaji, Guwahati, Pasarighat, Gandhinagar, Ranchi, Bhopal, Imphal Tiruchirapalli etc, covering almost the entire landmass of India. There is tremendous potential in India to build an effective ecosystem to enable our burgeoning urban areas to become smart by using digital technology. This in turn will create employment opportunities and contribute to economic growth through innovation. Our cities are fast becoming the defining units of human habitation. How smartly we build, manage and operate our cities will be the single biggest determinant of our people's future. We owe it to our future generations to make our cities smart through the use of technology.

Revised Scheme of Education and Training for Chartered Accountancy Course

Revised Scheme: Route I - Foundation Course#

Under the Foundation Course Route, the following Steps are required:

- ◆ Register with Board of Studies (BoS) after appearing in Class XII examination till June 30/Dec 31.
- ◆ Be eligible to appear for Foundation examination after passing Class XII examination. The first Foundation examination can be taken in November/May, as applicable, following passing Class XII examination.
- ◆ Qualify Foundation Course.
- ◆ Register with the BoS for the Intermediate Course.
- ◆ Complete 8 months of study course.
- ◆ Appear and Pass in either or both Groups of Intermediate Course.

Successfully complete Four Weeks Integrated Course on Information Technology and Soft Skills (ICITSS) before commencement of the Practical Training.

- ◆ Register for Three years Practical Training on passing either or both the Groups of Intermediate Course.
- ◆ Register for the Course after qualifying both the Groups of Intermediate Course.
- ◆ Successfully complete Four Weeks Advanced ICITSS during the last two years of Practical Training.
- ◆ Complete Practical Training.
- ◆ Appear in Final examination after completion of Practical Training and Advanced ICITSS.
- ◆ Become Member.

#Note: ICAI has decided in principle the above mentioned Scheme. However, the scheme will be notified in the official Gazette in due course.

Revised Scheme: Route II - Direct Entry Route#

The ICAI allows Commerce Graduates/Post-Graduates (with minimum 55% marks) or Other Graduates/Post-Graduates (with minimum 60% marks) and Intermediate level passed students of Institute Of Company Secretaries of India and Institute Of Cost Accountants of India to enter directly to its Intermediate Course. The following steps are required to be undertaken by the eligible Graduates and Post Graduates under this route:

- ◆ Register with the BoS for the Intermediate course (provisional registration allowed to the students doing Final year of graduation).
- ◆ Successfully complete Four Weeks Integrated Course on Information Technology and Soft Skills (ICITSS) before commencement of the Practical Training.

Revised Scheme: Route II - Direct Entry Route#

- ◆ Register for Three Years Practical Training.
- ◆ Appear in Intermediate Examination after nine months of Practical Training.
- ◆ Qualify Intermediate Course.
- ◆ Register for the Final Course after qualifying both Groups of Intermediate Course.
- ◆ Successfully complete Four Weeks Advanced ICITSS during the last two years of Practical Training.
- ◆ Complete Practical Training.
- ◆ Appear in Final examination after completion of Practical Training and Advanced ICITSS.
- ◆ Become Member.

#Note: Candidates who have passed Intermediate level examination of ICSI or ICWAI and enter the CA Intermediate course directly shall be treated at par with Foundation passed students and shall have to undergo the CA course in the manner akin to the Foundation passed students.



FAQ on Admit Cards

May 2016 CA Exams

1. How do I get my admit card?

Admit cards in respect of **all eligible candidates** admitted to the Intermediate (IPC) and Final May 2016 examination, with their photographs and signatures on them, are hosted on www.icaicai.nic.in.

Candidates may print their admit cards from the website.

In terms of the decision of the Examination Committee of the Institute, physical admit cards are being sent by post, only to those who submitted physical examination forms (i.e. OMR form). The practice of sending physical admit cards by post, to those who had submitted their exam forms online, is discontinued with effect from May 2014 examination onwards. Further, with effect from May 2015 exams, physical admit cards will be printed on A 4 size plain paper instead of on pre printed admit card stationery.

Physical admit cards as mentioned above, sent by post as well as those printed from the website are valid for admission to the examination.

Admit card downloaded from the website contains your photograph and specimen signature, besides other necessary details and is a valid admit card for gaining admission to the examination. However, should there be still any query, feel free to contact the Helpline numbers of the Exam dept. given in answer to Question No.14.

2. Will the admit cards contain my photograph and signature?

Yes, if the application you have submitted contains them.

3. I had not affixed my photograph in the exam form. Can I send them now?

Yes. However, once the admit cards are posted/hosted, no changes will be made thereon. The photographs will be used at the time of preparation of mark sheets/pass certificates. We advise you to carry with you a photo identity card issued by the Govt. agencies or by ICAI at the time of registration as articled assistants, to the examination hall, along with the admit card downloaded/printed from the website. Also please refer to the reply to question no. 7 given herein below.

4. How do I print my admit card from the website?

Visit the site <http://www.icaicai.nic.in>.

Enter the following:

- Select the examination for which you submitted the exam form
- Student registration number or the bar code of the examination form; and
- Personal Identification Number (PIN) indicated by you in your application form.

Your admit card and the "Instructions to Examinees" will appear on the screen. You can then print the same in A 4 size paper.

5. What is PIN?

It is the four digit number of your choice which you have entered in your exam form. It is like a password. Without this, you will not be able to download/print your admit card from the website.

6. I forgot my PIN. What can I do now?

We had advised you, earlier, while you filled up the exam form, to memorise or keep it safe for future reference. We had also advised you to keep a copy of the exam form for reference at a later date, if need be. You can now check the copy of the form for the PIN.

If you had not complied with that, you may call our Helpline numbers of the Exam Dept. or the respective regional office(s) for assistance in the matter.

7. My photograph and/or signature are not there in the admit card. Is it valid?

Yes. It is valid. However, in such cases where your photograph is not on the admit card, you should carry a photo identity card issued by the Govt. agencies or issued by ICAI at the time of registration as articled assistants, failing which you will not be allowed entry into the examination hall.

Else, you may get your photograph and signature attested by a Chartered Accountant or a Gazetted Officer on his official letterhead(in duplicate) indicating inter-alia the following:

and carry the same to the examination centre, as proof of your identity. You will be required to hand over the original to the exam centre and retain one copy for yourselves.

8. I have downloaded my admit card from the website. However, details therein do not relate to me. What should I do?

Contact the Helpline numbers (mentioned below) immediately, quoting your registration number, bar code number of your examination form and receipt number issued by the regional office(s), if any, centre opted (with zone, if applicable), telephone number, fax number etc.

9. I have downloaded my admit card from the website. However, details therein are different from what I had filled in my exam application form. What should I do now?

Send an email or contact the Helpline numbers (mentioned below) immediately, quoting your registration number, bar code number of your examination form and receipt number issued by the regional office(s), centre opted (with zone, if applicable), telephone number, fax number etc.

10. I have not yet received the physical admit card sent by post by ICAI. What should I do?

In terms of the decision of the Examination Committee of the Institute, physical admit cards are being sent by post, only to those who submitted physical examination forms (i.e. OMR).

The practice of sending physical admit cards by post, to those who had submitted their exam forms online, is discontinued with effect from May 2014 examination onwards.

Physical admit cards (printed on plain A-4 size sheet, instead of on pre printed admit card stationery), to those who had submitted physical exam forms (i.e. OMR forms) have already been dispatched. You will be receiving them shortly. However, even if you do not receive them, due to delays in transit, do not worry. You can print your admit card from the website <http://www.icaai.nic.in> and carry the same to the examination hall. It is also valid.

11. I have not yet received the physical admit card sent by post by ICAI. Can I have a duplicate admit card issued?

No. Duplicate admit cards will not be issued. However, a print out of the admit card on A4 size paper will be issued, on request, which will be valid for admission to the examination. In fact, you can take a print out of the admit card from the website www.icaai.nic.in yourself and use the same.

12. I am not able to print my admit card from the site. What should I do?

Contact the Helpline numbers (mentioned below) immediately, quoting your registration number, bar code number of your examination form and receipt number issued by the regional office(s), centre opted (with zone, if applicable), telephone number, fax number etc.

13. I received my admit card. I have a valid exemption in a paper. However, the admit card does not show that exemption. Will I get the exemption?

Exemptions granted to you are not shown on the admit card. Please go through the relevant statement of marks of the exam, where in your opinion, you were granted an exemption in a paper(s).

Alphabet "E" printed against the marks of a paper denotes that marks of that paper have been brought forward from an exemption granted in that paper in an earlier attempt.

So also, "#" symbol printed against the marks of a paper denotes that you have been granted an exemption in that paper, which will be valid for the next three following exams. Also the result below that Group shows "F-EX"

If no such symbol or alphabet is printed against the marks of any paper, even though the marks obtained in that paper may be more than 60, then that indicates that no exemption has been granted in that paper.

Also kindly refer to the FAQs on exemptions hosted on the website for more details.


EICASA Guwahati Activities
